



Tenebrae Service – A Journey Through Darkness

Wednesday, April 16th | 5:30 PM | In the Church.

Step into one of the most solemn and powerful services of Holy Week—the Tenebrae Service.

Tenebrae, meaning "darkness" or "shadows," is an ancient service that draws us into the suffering and sacrifice of Christ through scripture, candlelight, and silence. As we recreate the betrayal, abandonment, and agony of Jesus' Passion, the service leaves us in silence—unresolved—reminding us that the story is not complete until Easter.

A Gradual Darkening – Throughout the service, we extinguish candles one by one from a special candelabrum known as the "hearse," symbolizing the growing darkness as Christ approaches the Cross. Only the Christ candle remains, representing His enduring light in the midst of suffering.

A Moment of Silence & Sound - In the final moments, the church is plunged into darkness, and a loud noise—the "strepitus" (Latin for "great noise") —shatters the silence, recalling the earthquake and the tearing of the temple veil at Jesus' death.

A Time for Reflection – This powerful experience sets the mood for the coming days of the Triduum, drawing us into the mystery of Christ's Passion and preparing our hearts for the light of the Resurrection.

This is a deeply moving and unique liturgical experience that brings the reality of Holy Week into focus. We invite you to join us for this powerful service of reflection and anticipation.

Come, sit in the shadows, and journey through the Passion of Christ as we await the dawn of Easter. \$\frac{1}{4}\$

Pastoral

Saint Francis Borgia (Died: 1572) (Feast: October 10)

Francis Borgia came from a powerful and influential family. He lived an intensely holy life in the midst of enormous political responsibility. He was surrounded from childhood by caregivers chosen for their virtue. He served at the imperial court, where it is said he never spoke ill of others or indulged in vices. He married Eleanor, a lady -in-waiting of the empress, with whom he had eight children.

After Eleanor died, Francis made provisions for his children and estates and entered the Jesuits. Saint Ignatius of Loyola appointed him the order's commissary general of Spain. In this capacity, he founded Spain's first Jesuit novitiate as well as a

number of schools. In 1565, he was chosen to lead the entire order.

When he was, as he said, "smitten with the sword of responsibility," he addressed his fellow Jesuits, begging them to offer to God the "fruits of obedience, humility, and

patience," to give their neighbors "the oil of mercy and the other remedies," to forget their own differences and "begin a new life, destroying the old man and raising up the new, so that the simplicity, obedience, charity, and humility of the primitive Society may be revived in our hearts." The Jesuit order expanded under his leadership, and he is sometimes called the second founder.

Gospel Reflection:



Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!

Ready or not, we've entered Holy Week—what we call the Semana Mayor, the Great Week. It is a sacred time, a time unlike any other, where we pause to remember and to walk with Jesus as He enters Jerusalem, not in splendor and power, but in humility and love.

The crowds wave their palms, shouting praises. The streets are alive with hope. The King has come! But this same crowd—how quickly it changes. In just a few days, we will move from celebration to sorrow, from palms to the Passion, from "Hosanna" to "Crucify him." And so I ask you—how will we accompany Jesus this

week?

What are our plans—not just as individuals, but as families, as a parish community? Some may take time for rest, some may travel—and that is good and needed. But wherever we go, let us not leave Jesus behind. Let us make space for prayer, for silence, for reflection on the mystery of His love.

This is the week when we remember His betrayal... His abandonment...His suffering... We remember Judas, who traded Him for silver. Peter, who denied knowing Him.

The disciples, who ran in fear after promising to stay.

And yet, Jesus remains love. A love that never gives up, even when surrounded by darkness.

He heals the soldier who comes to arrest Him.

He forgives those who crucify Him.

He promises paradise to a thief beside Him.

What does this love say to us today?

What is Jesus inviting us to?

Each one of us must answer that in our own heart. But one thing is clear: at the end of the road, at the end of all the pain and betrayal, it is love that triumphs.

Let us walk this week with hearts open, following Jesus step by step. Let us not be spectators of His Passion, but companions on the way.

And as we do, may we come to know more deeply that love is not defeated. Love is what endures. Love is what saves. \$\P\$

The Stones Will Cry Out - By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman

1 have a complicated relationship with evangelization.

I don't think that we (I'm talking about 21st-century American Catholics here) have had much formation around what exactly it means to proclaim the Gospel. We don't know how to do it. We don't really want to do it. It sounds kind of scary and awkward. It sounds like knocking on strangers' doors and yelling through the keyhole, "Have you accepted Christ as your Lord and Savior?" It sounds like arguing with friends and family. It sounds like a real pain.

I'm Catholic. I'm proud of being Catholic. I do my Catholic things in my Catholic house throughout my Catholic life. But is that enough?

All Christians are called to "wordless witness" in how they live their lives, writes Paul VI in the apostolic exhortation *Evangelii Nuntiandi* — but this alone, he says, is "insufficient." We must talk about Jesus. We must name him. We must speak of his life, his

promises. We must *proclaim* him. We must be loud enough that a Pharisee would cringe at us.

And yet — and Paul VI acknowledges this — it's not actually evangelization if we do it so badly that nobody listens. If we "impose" truth on someone's conscience instead of "proposing" it. If we make the mistake of thinking there is one singular way to share Christ with the great variety of personalities that exist in this world.

Dear reader, I am running out of column space, and still I have no answers for you, or for myself. I don't know how to do it well. But I know we have to try. We have to pray. We have to reflect. We have to be patient. We have to be humble. We have to remember it's about him and not about us.

Most of all, when we find ourselves confused and retreating into silence, we must remember Christ's words: "If they keep silent, the stones will cry out."

Wait...What Happened to the Gloria?

If you've noticed the Gloria is missing at Mass lately, it's not a mistake—it's part of the Catholic Church's tradition during Lent.

The Gloria in Excelsis Deo ("Glory to God in the highest") is a joyful hymn sung on Sundays and feast days. But during Lent, it is intentionally left out. Why? Because Lent is a penitential season—a time of reflection, repentance, and preparation for Easter. The Church invites us to walk with Christ through the desert, fasting not only with our bodies, but even in our liturgy.

Omitting the Gloria—and also the *Alleluia* before the Gospel—is one way the Church "fasts" from joyful expressions. Music tends to be more subdued, and the overall tone of Mass is more reflective. This helps prepare our hearts to fully celebrate the

Resurrection when Easter comes.

You'll hear the Gloria again during the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, which marks the beginning of the Easter Triduum. It returns triumphantly during the Easter Vigil, when the Church bursts into full celebration of Christ's Resurrection.

A similar change happens during **Advent**, though for a different reason. While the Gloria is omitted during Advent too, the season is not as penitential. Advent is more about anticipation and quiet hope. So music still shifts to a more restrained tone, reflecting waiting rather than repentance.

So if Mass feels a little quieter these days, that's intentional. It's a beautiful part of the Church's rhythm—fasting now, so we can truly feast later. \$\frac{1}{4}\$

Where do Palm Sunday palms come from and where should they go?

These days, obtaining palms takes a lot of planning and coordination, as hundreds of thousands of churches worldwide need them on the same day! Many in the United States order palms from Florida, California, Texas, or Central America.

The palms used on Palm Sunday are blessed at Mass. This means they shouldn't end up in the trash! Many people weave palms into crosses or display them in their homes often across the top of a hanging crucifix

or cross. If you do not plan on displaying your palms throughout the year, they should be burned, buried, or placed in the basket you will find in the Narthax (back of church). If you burn them, the ashes should be disposed of reverently - either by burying them or spreading them in the garden. Parishes burn their extra supply of blessed palms to provide the ashes for next year's Ash Wednesday service. \$\forall \tag{1}\$



An Invitation to Experience God's Boundless Mercy: Divine Mercy Sunday - April 27

As we continue to bask in the radiant joy of Easter, our hearts are drawn to a profound celebration that Pope Saint John Paul II established for the universal Church in the Jubilee Year 2000. This special feast emerged through the mystical experiences of Saint Faustina Kowalska, to whom Jesus revealed the unfathomable depths of His merciful heart. In our journey of faith, we sometimes find ourselves carrying burdens of regret, doubt, or spiritual weariness. Divine Mercy Sunday stands as a healing reminder that God's mercy awaits us not as a distant possibility, but as a present reality. As Jesus told Saint Faustina: "My Heart overflows with great mercy for souls, and especially for poor sinners... Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though it's sins be as scarlet."

The Divine Mercy devotion offers us five beautiful pathways to encounter God's transforming mercy:

- **Feast** We celebrate God's infinite mercy on this special Sunday, when Christ promised extraordinary graces to those who approach Him with trust
- **Image** We venerate the sacred image of the Merciful Jesus, with rays of pale and red light flowing from His heart, bearing the promise: "Jesus, I trust in You"
- Novena We bring different souls before the throne of mercy through a nine-day journey of prayer beginning on Good Friday. There will be Divine Mercy brochures available in the Narthex.
- Chaplet We offer prayers that echo the sacrifice of Christ, appealing to the Father's mercy for ourselves and our world
- **Hour of Mercy** We pause at 3:00 PM—the sacred hour of Christ's sacrifice—to unite ourselves with His redemptive love

In a world often marked by division, judgment, and spiritual hunger, the message of Divine Mercy speaks directly to our deepest yearning for healing and reconciliation. As Saint John Paul II reminded us, "Where, if not in Divine Mercy, can the world find refuge and the light of hope?"

From Lourdes to Tucson: Jean Fenigan's Mission to Shelter Homeless Women

On March 23, Santa Catalina Catholic Church hosted a presentation featuring Jean Fenigan, the founder and chief mission officer of Sister Jose Women's Shelter. Jean's advocacy for women was sparked by an eye-opening experience at the healing center in Lourdes, France, which attracts 6 million visitors annually and relies solely on volunteers. While volunteering, Jean learned about the lack of shelters for homeless women in France, which led her to establish Sister Jose Women's Shelter in Arizona, inspired by Sister Jose Hobday's call to action: "Stand up, look around, find someone who needs something."

The presentation highlighted the growing issue of homelessness among women. In 2025, women constitute 33% of the homeless population, up from 20% two decades earlier. This increase is notably prevalent among senior women, driven by inadequate Social Security benefits averaging \$941 per month, against the backdrop of the lowest-priced studio in Tucson costing \$1,000. Consequently, single women find it virtually impossible to afford housing.

Initially, her shelter could accommodate 13 women, but it has expanded to 54 beds. Despite this increase, the demand far exceeds the supply, with three times as many women in need of housing. Jean detailed her long-term potential solution:

purchasing an acre of land to construct tiny houses.

The shelter also addresses the unique needs of these women by allowing pets, providing security and companionship, crucial for those vulnerable to trafficking and other dangers. Additionally, a touching moment arose when St. Vincent de Paul donated silk pajamas. This gesture led to bonding among the residents, fostering a sense of community within the shelter.

To support the ongoing efforts of Sister Jose Women's Shelter, donations are encouraged through Qualified Charitable Organization number #20826, especially with the tax filing deadline approaching. Contributions will aid in continuing the crucial work of providing a safe haven for homeless women in Tucson.
