


Our Santa Catalina Ministries will prepare crockpots of meatless soups each Friday evening in Lent.


member. I met my current husband here and we were married in Santa Catalina Church.

Is Ash Wednesday a Holy Day of Obligation?

Ash Wednesday (March 5) marks the beginning of Lent, a 40-day period of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving in preparation for Easter. Celebrated by Christians worldwide, especially Catholics, it falls 46 days before Easter Sunday.

On this day, ashes made from the burned palms of the previous year's Palm Sunday are blessed and applied to our foreheads in the shape of a cross. The accompanying words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return," remind us of our mortality.

Despite the often packed churches, you may be surprised to hear that the answer to the above question is no, it is not a holy day of obligation.

Holy days of obligation commemorate a particular event (such as the birth of Christ at Christmas) or

celebrate particular people (such as Mary's Immaculate Conception or the feast of All Saints). Ash Wednesday is a day of penance, fasting, and abstinence to begin the season of Lent. In a sense, it focuses on a *concept* rather than something particular and concrete.

Of course, repentance ought to be reflected in particular, concrete ways! That's one of the reasons that attending Mass on Ash Wednesday is a very good idea. It marks the beginning of a solemn season of penance. Despite all its comparisons to the desert, Lent can be very fruitful for our spiritual growth! Beginning this season with the celebration of Mass and the reception of ashes is a sign of our commitment to God and to spiritual growth. ©LPi

Fasting, Explained

The practice of fasting predates Christianity. The Old Testament is full of examples of righteous men and women mortifying their flesh for the purpose of making atonement or simply to grow closer to God. Jesus himself fasted for forty days and forty nights in preparation for the beginning of his public ministry, and we see his disciples following his example in the Acts of the Apostles.

Fasting continues to be an important part of Christian devotional life today. Many people feel the practice of fasting enhances their prayer and helps them fulfill St. Paul's advice to "put to death the deeds of the body" (Romans 8:13) to grow in the Spirit. Most Catholics will associate fasting with the liturgical season of Lent, which begins and ends with obligatory fasting for all members of the Latin Catholic Church between ages 18 and 59.

Gospel Reflection

Ripples of Mercy: What You Give Returns

This week, Jesus calls us beyond the Golden Rule—"Do to others as you would have them do to you"—and invites us to an even higher standard: "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful" (Luke 6:36). Mercy is more than kindness—it is love in action.

This teaching isn't just theoretical—it's lived out in the story of **David and Saul**. King Saul, who sought to kill David, was delivered into David's hands. Justice would have allowed David to take revenge, but instead, he chose mercy. David's actions perfectly captured what Jesus teaches us today: **mercy multiplies when it is given**.

This principle is known as the *Law of Echo*: our words and deeds send ripples into the world, shaping the reality we experience. Jesus affirms this when He says: *"Forgive*"

and you will be forgiven. Give and gifts will be given to you" (Luke 6:37-38). If we sow mercy, we will reap mercy. If we choose resentment, it will return to us in kind. A well-known story illustrates this truth.

There was once a man who had heard Buddha's teaching: "Never return evil for evil." Wanting to test this wisdom, he approached Buddha one day to see if he truly practiced what he preached. The man began shouting hateful words, calling the great teacher a **stupid fool**. Buddha listened

patiently. When the man finally ran out of things to say, Buddha asked, "My son, if someone offers you a gift but you refuse it, to whom does the gift belong?"

The man answered scornfully, "Any fool knows that. The gift goes back to the giver!"

Buddha then said, "I decline to accept your insults."

Then Buddha added: "My son, a man who slanders a virtuous person is like a man who flings dust into the wind. The dust doesn't reach its target. It only blows back into the face of the man who threw it."

This story powerfully reflects Jesus' teaching. Just as the dust blown into the wind returns to the one who threw it, anger, judgment, and vengeance do not harm our enemies as much as they damage our own souls.

If we want a world filled with love and kindness, we must first be agents of love and kindness.



This week, I invite you to take up Jesus' challenge. Each day, find one way to echo mercy. Forgive someone who has hurt you, speak a kind word where there is tension, or give generously without expecting anything in return. Trust that what you send out will return to you in "good measure, pressed down, shaken together, and overflowing" (Luke 6:38).

The Secret Ingredient

Mia was a talented baker in her small town, known for her sweet treats and cheerful smile. Her little bakery, *The Bread Basket*, was a favorite stop for everyone, especially during the Lenten season when she made special hot cross buns. But this year, something felt different. Her usual joy seemed dulled by the endless rhythm of baking, selling, and cleaning.

On Ash Wednesday, as Mia sat in the pew, the priest's homily about giving during Lent struck her. "Lent isn't just about giving things up," he said. "It's about giving of yourself—your time, your talents, your heart."

That night, inspired by his words, Mia made a bold decision. She would give away a portion of her baked goods every day during Lent to the less

fortunate in her town. The next morning, she prepared extra loaves of bread and buns, wrapping them carefully and heading out to the shelter on the edge of town.

At first, she was nervous. Would people accept her gift? Would they even like her baking? But as she handed out the warm bread, the smiles and heartfelt thanks she received began to warm her own heart. Word spread quickly, and soon, people began leaving small donations to help Mia continue her mission.

As Easter approached, Mia realized her bakery felt alive again—not just because of the delicious smells or busy customers, but because she had rediscovered her purpose. She hadn't just shared bread; she had shared hope, love, and kindness.

And that was the secret ingredient she'd been missing all along. 🕆

"Oh, well. I'm going to hell anyway, right?"

I have a few family members and friends who are not practicing Catholics who say this to me from time to time. It's always spoken in a teasing manner, — or maybe even actively dislike us. Much is said with a wink and a shoulder shrug, usually to explain these days of the "culture wars." I certainly don't away some sort of minor misbehavior they feel guilty about.

It saddens me that Christians have somehow gained this reputation as a people who judge, who condemn. I think in part it stems from a misunderstanding on the part of unchurched people (and lots of churched ones, too) regarding what constitutes "judging." It is absolutely not "judging" someone to disagree with a personal decision, whatever that decision may be, or to decline from participating in that decision. We all have functioning consciences; we are all supposed to discern the moral goodness of any action before we take it.

Today's Gospel is an invitation for us to consider how we engage with people who disagree with us disagree that it can often feel like you're fighting a war when you're trying to live as the Church teaches. The forces against you often seem overwhelming and nefarious. And guess what? They are.

But we need to remember who the enemy really is. The enemy is not other children of God, even if they are children of God who are actively promoting ideas that are wrong. Perhaps these people are misguided and mistaken. Perhaps they are misled by the devil. Have we not all been misled by him at some point?

We must interact lovingly with people who think differently and live differently from us. The
